


Climate change in Southern Europe

Probable scenario:

Higher temperatures
 (especially in summer periods)

 Higher rainfall stationality (lower in summer periods)





Extended dry periods





Adaptation of crops

 Some crops not suited any more to climate conditions

Opportunity: new crops





Not only climate is changing ...

 Areas of former agricultural land no longer used

Galicia as an example ... 1985-2005

Net decrease of agricultural area
 145,000 ha (15%)

- 106,000 ha occupied by shrubs
- 233,000 ha occupied by forests

Similar situation in other Mediterranean regions



Changes in Mediterranean landscapes

- Increasing presence of biomass
 - Total volume
 - Continuity


A dangerous equation ...



Biomass + hot, dry periods = Wildfires

Increasing risk of wildfires

Volume & Continuity of biomass

Increasingly hot & dry summers

 Both can be expected to be more common in the future

 - Efficient use of local resources


